Wednesday 13 August: Attended a meeting of the **Dunedin Shanghai Association and the Otago Chamber of Commerce** hosted by Malcolm Wong at which **Anna Campbell**, Director of AbacusBio gave a talk in the "Trading with China" series on "Food, China and the New Zealand Opportunity". Anna described her experience in China including working with Chinese companies to lift the value of New Zealand food, determining what

drives food purchases for Chinese consumers and the start of AbacusBio's journey to work with Chinese companies to improve China's selfsufficiency in agri-food production.

LANGUAGE OPPORTUNITIES:

1. CHINESE LANGUAGE AND CULTURE FOR BUSINESS PEOPLE.

A course, targeted to business people, which includes business etiquette, greetings, introductions and concentrated practice at this -Would this be ideal for you?

Dunedin NZCFS, in association with Otago University's Confucius Institute satellite office, is offering an intensive introduction to Chinese language and culture. Robyn Broughton, International Coordinator, University of Otago writes:

China is New Zealand's "number 2" market after Australia – we all manage to greet our Australian visitors appropriately, but our Chinese visitors often not so well. Learning Mandarin opens doors to nearly 1/5th of the worlds' population who spent over \$672million in New Zealand last year.

I am writing to advise that the University of Otago Branch of the Confucius Institute in Auckland, in partnership with the Otago Branch of the New Zealand China Friendship Society, is delighted to be able to offer Mandarin and Chinese Business Culture classes to people in Dunedin. The classes will take the form of an Introduction to Mandarin and Chinese Business culture.

We will provide all resources that the attendees will need. This initial course will cover an introduction to Mandarin (Pinyin); Chinese business culture; how to introduce yourself in Mandarin etc and a lot of practice getting pronunciation correct. It will all be hands on and practical.

When: Monday 6, Tuesday 7 and Wednesday 8 October 2014 from 5.30 to 7.30pm (total 6 hours)

Where: Burns 5 Lecture Theatre, Ground Floor, Arts Building (entrance from Albany Street between the Arts Building and the Central Library).

Tutor: Wei Mao. "I'm originally from China. I've lived here for about six years. I recently just finished my MA in Applied Linguistics at Victoria University. My study is focused on teaching Chinese as a foreign language. Before that I completed a graduate diploma in second language teaching at Otago University. I also graduated with a BA in English Education from a teacher training university back in China, and am a qualified secondary teacher who taught for three years there. At the moment I'm teaching Chinese Mandarin at two primary schools and a Chinese language school. I also privately tutor some students." There will be a nominal charge of \$20.00 (for the three nights, not per night) per person to offset some costs.

and Tokoiti School (both in Milton) so this will extend the opportunity further for local young people to grow their awareness of Chinese culture and language.

ACCENT ON YOUTH: 4. Columba Students in Wuhan

From Columba College recent news, July 2014 Confucius Institute Cultural Immersion Camp 2014

We were lucky to be selected to go on a twoweek camp to China in the April holidays, with a group of students from around the South Island. We spent a week on the Huazhong University of Science and Technology campus in Wuhan, a week in Beijing, and a day in Shanghai. We visited tourist locations and schools; were immersed in Chinese culture; had language classes with practical exercises in local markets and restaurants; and made several new friends. Places we visited included: The Great Wall, the Olympic park, the Summer Palace, the Shanghai waterfront, the Yellow Crane Tower, and the Forbidden City.

We both particularly enjoyed the Wuhan section of the trip. Because we were staying on campus, we were given a reasonable amount of independence during our free time. We really enjoyed this because many of the best insights we gained into Chinese culture came from the simple moments we had while exploring on our own. Everything from watching another three people cram into our tiny bus (which already held about 12 people and looked like it should only hold eight), to watching the streets flood with people whenever a class ended, to choosing a wide variety of unusual (but delicious) foods in the canteens, to having strangers ask to take pictures with us on the street. It was a very empowering way to start the trip and gave us plenty of opportunities to bond with our new friends and practise speaking Mandarin.

Another reason we particularly enjoyed Wuhan was that most of the activities and visits we did there were unusual, rather than to famous tourist destinations. Our favourite visit of the entire trip was to Xianning High School, two hours away from Wuhan. The school had never had foreigners visit, so they treated us like celebrities, asking to take thousands of photos with us. In pairs (we were together) we presented to individual classes (of seventy students!) about New Zealand. It was incredibly fun because they were so excited to have us there; and they were very engaged in our presentation. We learned heaps about China from them, too. When we told them our school day was from 8.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m., they replied along the lines of, "That's nothing! So do you have a lot of homework instead?" When we told them we usually had about two hours of homework the whole class's jaws dropped as they exclaimed, "Wow, you're lucky!"

By the end of the trip we felt inspired, empowered, and thoroughly delighted with the experience. We had also come to realize that fundamentally Chinese people are not at all different from New Zealanders. Ultimately, we had a new perception of not only China –but the whole world. Unfortunately, this trip is only available to the students who take Chinese but we highly recommend applying for it if you get the chance. Languages take you places!
