

2010 NZCFS Projects and Rural Communities Tour

After a very successful 2009 projects tour, the **2010 tour** is in the planning stage. This year, Dave Bromwich will lead the tour to **project partners in Hebei, Sichuan and Guangxi**, with connections to He Mingqing scholars, cooperatives, earthquake reconstruction, and agricultural technologies. A highlight is meeting NZCFS project partners, and the communities who have benefited.

We will travel the backblocks to visit **Tibetan communities** in a detour to **West Sichuan** through high mountains and grasslands, and in **East Guizhou** visit Miao and Dong communities. We will enjoy good quality local cuisine, and gain an understanding of history, culture and life as we go.

Planning is for around 20 days in China, 9-30 October, with a cost estimate of approximately \$6000 all up, excluding visa and insurances.

THE YEAR OF THE TIGER 14/2/2010 – 2/2/2011

The Tiger is one of the most beautiful creatures on the planet, and is feared and revered in equal measure. It features in many Asian cultures as a manifestation of courage, power, passion and royalty. The Tiger symbolizes the female **Yin** energy as opposed to the **Yang** male energy of the dragon. It is a sign of courage and is fearless and this fiery fighter is revered by the ancient Chinese as a sign that wards off the three main disasters of a household: fire, thieves and ghosts.



Ancient Chinese believe that the markings on the forehead of tigers resemble the Chinese character for "**Wang**", or King. In Imperial China, where the dragon is the insignia of the Emperors, the tiger is the military emblem of the highest supreme commanders of the army symbolizing fearlessness and victory. The Tiger also represents Earth, while the dragon represents Heaven. The powerful and stealth prowess of the Tiger inspires the martial art movements of many **Kung-Fu** masters.

Courageous, active, and self-assured. Optimistic, passionate and independent. Rebellious, dynamic, and unpredictable. Quick tempered but considerate. Affectionate but careless. The Tiger is a natural born leader and symbolizes power, passion and daring. People born in the Year of the Tiger are generally well liked because of their charming personalities.

Tigers are fond of competitions. They simply cannot pass up a challenge. They may appear cool and are unpredictable, and it would be unwise to underestimate their reactions. REWI ALLEY MAKES TOP TEN - Over 56 million votes cast recently on an Internet survey organised by China Radio International to find the Top Ten Foreign Friends of China over the last 60 years, saw **Rewi Alley** recording millions of votes to be rated number seven.

The final Top Ten Foreign Friends are an amazing list of outstanding individuals headed by the Canadian **Doctor Norman Bethune**, for whom the New Zealand missionary nurse, Kathleen Hall smuggled medical supplies through the Japanese lines to keep his medical clinic operational. The list includes **John Rabe**, the revered German working in Nanjing, who saved thousands from slaughter in that city during the Massacre in 1937. Each of the Top Ten has made memorable efforts in aid of the Chinese people, many of whom were friends of Rewi Alley like **Edgar Snow of USA**, **Dr Joseph Needham of the UK** and **Israel Epstein of Poland**.

Philippa Reynolds, Rewi Alley's niece, goes to Beijing - An Award Ceremony was held in Beijing on December 8th where Philippa Reynolds of Nelson received the Award on Rewi's behalf in the Great Hall of the People. In 1997 Philippa, on behalf of the Christchurch Gansu Friendly Relations Committee, wrote a biography, "*Rewi Alley - From Canterbury To China*", to recognise the 100-year celebrations of Rewi Alley's birth, and visited many of his residences in China during the year.
