association with things Chinese not least because I have been married to a Kiwi Chinese for the last 42 years and enjoyed being part of an extended Chinese family now spread across NZ and Australia. Professionally I have had a long career in pharmacy education mostly at the University of Otago and through my job have been able to work in China on a number of occasions first in Nanjing in 2000 and Jilin University in Changchun in the North East. On my most recent visit in 2013, I spent a semester studying Mandarin at Dong Bei Shi Fan Da Xue (North East Normal University).



I'm still nowhere near fluent but I continue to work at it both because it's a fascinating language and I enjoy the challenge. Although now retired from the University, I maintain strong friendships with colleagues in China, work as an English language Editor for a Chinese Pharmaceutical Journal and continue to assist graduate students in Nanjing and Changchun to publish their research work in International English Language Journals.

There is so much happening in China and I'm happy if I can contribute even in a small way to the development of such a dynamic and exciting society.

As your new Branch President, I'm keen to grow our Association and increase its role in promoting cross-cultural exchange and disseminating knowledge about China and its culture. After all, we live in exciting times; China has become our major trading partner, the source of increasing tourism and a country whose language is finally being promoted in New Zealand Schools. We also live in a city with a long history of connections with China, a sister city of that mighty metropolis Shanghai and the only city in the country with a genuine Chinese Garden.

The local Branch is currently involved in a number of initiatives and I intend to do what I

GUEST SPEAKER: ANNIE ZONG A Layman Listens – a brief report on Annie's talk on the topic: CHINA'S LAW AND LEGAL SYSTEM

Annie's family and professional background enabled her to give us a lot of insight into China's strange (to

many of us Kiwis) legal system, or lack of it. Her father was a "prosecuting officer", and she trained in Tianjin and also the UK and specialised in



commercial law. Annie - during London training days.

She gave us an historical perspective, explaining how European and Japanese civil law systems were influential before the CCP. Then came the changes of the cultural revolution which removed the legal elite. The legal profession grew again only after the cultural revolution, especially in commercial aspects with connections to international law firms in the market.

The Judicial Court system has three levels: the Supreme Court, the Local Courts and Prosecuting officers. Annie gave us examples of how the prosecuting officers are able to override a court's judgements. Unlike New Zealand where we are used to the separation of powers between executive and judicial processes, in China the strong party dominance of judicial issues (through the "Central Politics and Law Commission") leads to a number of difficulties: "changeable interpretations, lack of clarity and unpredictability, unreasonable client expectations and bureaucracy" are some of the problems; and above all the corruption which has been so prevalent and destructive.

However the legal system in China continues to evolve and the current leader of the Commission has



spoken out against excessive interference by officials in court proceedings. *Meng Jianzhu, Head of*

Central Politics and Law Commission

What a privilege to hear such an enthusiastic and clear speaker. Thank you, Annie.

We 'retired' to the Wong Gok restaurant for dinner with lots of follow up chat – from law, to corruption ("I love my country but hate the corruption"), to parental and personal experiences during the cultural revolution, to arguing about which is the easier/or harder language to learn, to favourite Chinese songs, and we ended with Annie giving us a snippet of Mo Li Hua, Jasmine Flowers.

MANDARIN LEARNING IN DUNEDIN

We welcome Confucius Institute teaches to Otago, and we begin our 2014 series of Mandarin Lessons.

Backgrounder: Check out this recent TVNZ news item about the work of the Confucius Institute:

This week the People's Republic of China sent 70 language assistants to primary and secondary schools throughout the country in an initiative set up as part of the 2008 Free Trade Agreement. "You can't build a relationship and sustain an economic relationship simply on selling dairy powder and other products, you have to have a cultural underpinning," says Confucius Institute chairman Tony Browne.

However, Mandarin has proved not to be a popular option for Kiwi children.
