Reception at the Auckland PRC Consulate, on December 19th, 2008

All members of the Auckland, Hamilton and Hibiscus Coast branches having been invited by Mme Liao Juhua to a reception for, your branch was represented by Your Editor and his wife Teri, Eric and Clarice Dittmer, Dicky and Trish Hutchings, and Graeme and Rosemary Platt.

The reception was opened by Mme Jia Xiuling, the Cultural Consul, who welcomed the special guest, Vic Percival, and the Society members. She then asked the new Consul-General, Mme. Liao Juhua to speak,

Mme Liao's speech is printed below.

Address by Consul General Mme. Liao Juhua

"Mr. George Andrews, Mr. Ian Howart, Members of the Auckland, Hamilton and Orewa Branches of New Zealand China Friendship Society, Distinguished guests, Ladies and Gentlemen,

Good afternoon! Thank you for coming to the reception and I would like to extend my warm welcome and kind greetings to you.



It marks the 30th anniversary this year of China's adoption of reform and openingup policy which has made it possible for China to achieve a historic transformation from a highly centralized planning economy to a vibrant socialist market economy, from a door closed or semi-closed society to the one that is fully open to the outside world. The policy has enabled China to maintain a fast economic growth for 30 years running. China's GDP kept growing at an annual

rate of 9.8% for three decades, more than three times the world average. It had

soared from more than 260 billion yuan in 1978 to 24,950 billion yuan in 2007¹, making China become the world's fourth largest economy. Chinese people have received more tangible benefits than ever before. By 2007, China's GDP accounted for over 5% of the world, whereas it was only 1% in 1978. The trade volume jumped from less than 1% to about 8% of the world during this period. China has carried out extensive international exchanges and cooperation, through which China's economy was boosted, China has also made important contribution to the world's economic development.

China's economic development faces challenges. The global financial turmoil will make it harder for China to maintain the pace of its economic development in the near future. China is under growing tension from its large population, limited resources and environment problems, and needs faster reform of its economic growth pattern to achieve sustainable development. The nation should maintain a stable and relatively fast economic growth, accelerate structural readjustment for sustainable development, and stick to reform and opening up.

2008 is the year of significance for the development of China, for the relations between China and New Zealand, and the Auckland region in particular.

At the time when China suffered from icy snow calamity and earthquake disaster, the New Zealand government and people, including friends from the NZ-China Friendship Society, were voluntarily making donations in support of China's fight against the catastrophes. 3 million NZ dollars of donations were transmitted to China by the Consulate General alone. Here, we wish to express our heartfelt gratitude to the government and people of NZ.

The successful Beijing Olympic Games has brought China's dream to hold Olympic Games into reality. The successful launch of space-ship Shenzhou 7, and the Chinese astronauts' first walk ever in space indicated a new leap forward of China's space technology. The above mentioned achievement further enhanced the friendship and mutual understandings between the people of China and the people of the world, including the people of New Zealand. During the Beijing Olympic Games, China got the strong support from New Zealand friends and I would like to thank you for that valuable support.

Over the 36 years since China and New Zealand established diplomatic relations, exchanges and cooperation between the two countries in various fields have been constantly strengthened. With the existing China-New Zealand good relations and the signing of the Free Trade Agreement between the two countries, bilateral exchanges and cooperations, inclusive of exchanges between China and the Auckland region will surely be further promoted.

As the bridge of China-New Zealand relations, NZ-China Friendship Society has done a great deal in the interest of the two countries and the two peoples. We recall that we held a function together with your association Auckland Branch to celebrate the launch of Maori TV series named **Kia Ora Ni Hao** and to welcome the opening ceremony of the Beijing Olympic Games, in which we saw the six young Maori friends having a wonderful time in Beijing. They like Beijing and the people there so much and were well received by the Chinese people. This TV series told us the story of friendship between the Chinese people and the people of New Zealand. The TV series about the Maori people was produced by Mr. George Andrews, Chairman of the NZ-

China Friendship Society Auckland Branch and will be rebroadcasted on the Maori Television this Sunday. 

and Vic Percival ('a good old friend of China'²), who thanked Consul-General Mme. Liao in their turn. The general emphasis of their speeches was the success of the New Zealand/China Free



Trade Agreement which was signed this year in Beijing. They said that New Zealand in particular should be very proud of our on-going relationship with China, being the first Western country to recognise the PRC and latterly, the first to sign such an agreement. Whilst expressing concern over the present economic crisis, they felt that the relationship between both countries was sufficiently strong to weather any economic downturn. All the speakers congratulated China on the tremendously successful 2008 Olympic Games

² Vic Percival (or Pan Xi Fo-西公Western Bhudda, as Chinese named him) is a long-standing (indeed since 1956) trader with China. He is perhaps better known in China than in New Zealand. However, he became the confidante of Prime Ministers and ambassadors, and it was Helen Clark who, at the signing of the Free-Trade Agreement, termed him: "The man who started it all".

in Beijing. George Andrews specifically thanked the Consulate for their help in organising the production of the television programme "Kia Ora Ni hao" made for Maori TV by his company.

The speeches were followed by an excellent buffet meal which everyone enjoyed and gave the members an opportunity to catch up on news from fellow branch members. During the meal, a DVD of the Olympic Games opening ceremony was shown.

Then Ms Maggie Ding sang 'O Mio Babbino Caro' and several other Western operatic arias in a beautiful clear soprano voice.



She was followed by Ms Wang Yue, a young flutist of great charm, who played several Western tunes most proficiently.


After this entertaining episode, the two older performers joined together to sing a selection of Chinese melodies.
