Yum cha, (飲茶, pin yin: yǐn chá) a term in Cantonese, literally meaning "drinking tea", refers to the custom of eating small servings of different foods while sipping Chinese tea in Cantonese speaking areas of southern China.

It is an integral part of the culinary culture of Guangdong Province and Hong Kong. In any city with a sizeable population of Cantonese people, to yum cha is a tradition

> on weekend mornings, and whole families gather to chat and eat dim sum

(點心, pinyin: di**ǎ**n xīn) and drink Chinese tea.

Yum cha is also a morning ritual for the elderly to spend a good part of the morning after early morning exercise of tai chi or a walk. The tea is important, for it is said to help digest the rich foods which are generally on offer. In the past, people went to a teahouse to yum cha, but dim
