Speaking on what it means to be a friend of China in this changing world



One of NZCFS' core objectives is "To promote friendship, understanding and goodwill between the peoples of China and New Zealand..."

Our society is at a crossroads. We are one of many players involved with China. Does NZCFS have a point of difference?

BRANCH MEETING 28 October 2020 — MEETING REPORT

'A full heart' – engaging with China

At our monthly members' meeting on Wednesday 28th October **Libby English Lyon** talked to us about her engagement with China and her own Mandarin learning journey. Libby also shared with us her experience of project managing this year's Chinese Language Week as part of Silvereye Communications, the company for which she acts as a U.S. consultant. The day following her presentation to us, Libby flew back to the United States with her husband Harrison to their home in Manhattan. We were extremely lucky that Libby was able to find time in her busy schedule to talk to us.



Engagement with China

Libby was born and grew up in Wellington and had an interest in world affairs from a very young age. Her parents went to China when she was 10 years old. The photographs, postcards, and gifts they brought back with them made her, in her own words, 'desperate' to know more. While working for her father at Agribusiness New Zealand, Libby became involved in exporting to China, Russia, Kazakhstan, and other countries in Asia. In 2015 she accompanied her father to China as part of a fresh milk brand launch, visiting Shanghai, Beijing, Hangzhou, Tianjin, and Inner Mongolia. Libby shared with us her experience of staying in buildings taller than she had ever seen in her life, visiting Alibaba headquarters, and going to farms 'in the middle of nowhere'.

At that time Libby recalled saying to her dad that she needed to live in China. 'I wanted to learn Mandarin and I wanted to be part of this place that really felt like the future.' A trip back to China later that year with her family confirmed her intention. 'I left China with a full heart. I didn't know when I would be back, but I knew I would be back.'

Learning Mandarin

Libby's opportunity to return to China came in 2018, when she won a NZ China Government Scholarship to attend Peking University to learn Mandarin. Libby had just become engaged to her future husband Harrison and now she was heading to Beijing for a full year's programme of study. Speaking frankly, Libby told us that 2019 was an extremely challenging year for her. 'The only Mandarin I knew was ní hǎo and xiè xiè, and I was suddenly alone in this gigantic city with Harrison who had never travelled to China before. He was just dropping me off so in a week I knew I would be totally alone.'

Libby talked to us about her experience of sharing a dorm room 'with a total stranger', getting from A to B, and setting up a bank account. She said that she had to learn very fast how to cope. Class every day for four to six hours was gruelling at first but soon it 'just became life'. Together with her classmates from Pakistan, Japan, America, Israel, India, Britain, Nigeria, and the Netherlands, Libby was broadening her world view. Later, when her language proficiency had improved, Libby was able to get around a little more easily, bargain with stallholders, and order food. According to Libby, 'all the day-to-day challenges and hard work became worth it.'



Chinese Language Week

Back in New Zealand, Libby resumed working with her mother's company Silvereye Communications, taking specific responsibility for managing Chinese Language Week. Founded in 2014 by Jo Coughlan and Raymond Huo, the week-long event has grown to include 'a few hundred' discrete events around the country. When Chinese Premier Li Keqiang visited New Zealand in 2017, he celebrated New Zealand as 'the first country to hold a nationwide Chinese Language Week.' From the start, the event has received strong support from both Chinese and New Zealand governments.

This year, the event included the donation of children's books written in three languages — English, Mandarin, and te reo Māori. Videos of ordinary New Zealanders speaking Mandarin were published on the Chinese Language Week website and distributed via social media. Youth ambassadors — high school students from around the country placed in the top ten in the Chinese Bridge speaking competition — showcased how our globally equipped young people can take on the future. In Auckland, the Sky Tower was illuminated for the first time in the NZ Chinese Language Week colours.

Libby told us that events like Chinese Language Week are 'critical to teach our kids the importance of diversity and inclusion.' In her own engagement with China, Libby feels she has built a deeper understanding of China and is committed to improving her language and her relationships. 'Tomorrow I jump on a plane to New York but as soon as I can I cannot wait to head back to China'.
