BRANCH MEETING 16th November 2022 - MEETING REPORT

Xu Tong is currently the Director of the Chinese Cultural Centre in Wellington. His talk, entitled "My Serendipity with Korowai", covered the finding and temporary return to New Zealand of a korowai or Māori cloak originally presented to Chairman Mao, and his involvement in these events. Director Xu uses the word "serendipity" because, although he ended up having a major role in the cloak's return, he feels this came about more through chance rather than anv predetermined plan.



Director Xu began by going over the history of the korowai. In 1957, the fifth Māori King Korokī Mahuta decided to present Chairman Mao Zedong with a korowai, a traditional Maori cloak of feathers, which can only be worn by individuals with a very high status. The presentation was recorded by a New Zealand film crew that was in China at the time to film the events taking place as part of the eighth anniversary of the founding of the PRC (side note: the film crew's trip to China was arranged by the NZCFS in response to a request from Rewi Alley).

After this, the korowai dropped out of sight, and no-one knew what had happened to it or where it was. This remained the case until John McKinnon, the New Zealand Ambassador to the PRC between 2001 and 2004, began making enquiries. At first, these enquiries had little

success. After some effort, it appeared that the most likely location for the korowai was the Chinese National Museum. However, the museum had no record of the korowai.

Given that the museum appeared to be the most likely location of the korowai, Ambassador McKinnon decided that the only option was to go through all the items stored in the museum to see if any of them was the missing item. During this search, a reference was discovered to a cloak gifted by a chief from Ceylon (now Sri Lanka). Since the Chinese names for Ceylon 锡 $\stackrel{\leq}{=}$ (Xī lán) and New Zealand 新西兰 (Xīnxīlán) are similar, it was suspected that this cloak could possibly be the korowai mistakenly identified as coming from Ceylon. When the item was actually investigated, this suspicion proved to be correct.

Now that the korowai had been found, the New Zealand Embassy in Beijing requested that it be temporarily returned to New Zealand for exhibition. This is the point at which Xu Tong became involved: he had just returned to China from a posting to Australia, and he was designated to respond to the request. Unfortunately, the korowai had been designated by the Chinese as a Class 1 gift, and such items are hardly ever allowed to leave China.

Despite this, Xu Tong and the New Zealand Embassy persisted in their efforts and, although the korowai remained in China, it was displayed during visits of the former New Zealand Prime Minister John Key and former Minister of Foreign Affairs Nanaia Mahuta. It was during the latter's term of office that the Chinese government finally gave permission for the temporary return of the korowai to New Zealand for exhibition at Te Papa. Xu Tong cites the fact that this happened while a relative of the Māori King who originally made the gift of the korowai was the New Zealand Minister of Foreign Affairs as yet another example of serendipity associated with the korowai.



The talk concluded with Xu Tong answering some questions from the audience, including details about his position in the Chinese National Museum when he became involved with the korowai, and also an investigation into what types of bird had been used to provide its feathers.

In the course of my first ambassadorial assignment I decided to track down a Māori cloak that had been presented to Chairman Mao by Ramai and Rudall Hayward, actress and film-maker, respectively, who visited China in 1957 at a time when there were no diplomatic relations between our two countries. The cloak had been categorised as coming from Sri Lanka, formerly known as Ceylon, and Xilan 锡兰 in Chinese. New Zealand is Xinxilan 新西兰, so the mistake was understandable. The museum authorities were generous in their recognition of the value of the cloak as a symbol of the relationship between New Zealand and China. Much later the cloak was loaned to Te Papa, and honoured there as a taonga, a treasure, for both our countries.
